Harrogate - June 20. 1828 -

My Dear Sister /

I received yours of the 12. from York, & from that I suppose you are by this time safely housed with your dear House-band and quaterens, all of whom & yourself are in good health - tell my dear Eliza that Aunt hopes she will perform her promise of writing me a few lines in Mamma's next letter to me - dear child! I love all your children my dear, but I must ever feel peculiarly & especially for my little Eliza - those months she was entrusted to me always afford me pleasure in looking back on them - it was like an hours sunshine in my then gloomy day of poverty & dependence - I have the satisfaction to inform you that we are all going on well my dear M. M. is quite well & with newspapers, Novels & Novels & watching, contrives to be very patient & tranquil - I could not at first find upon a book that would interest him, at length I have & since that time instead of his watching my every turn & look, he has now scarcely time to see whether I get on or go back in appearance for really my dear Sister, my ill health now all consists in outward appearance, for I really ^{am} very well else & have no excuse now for idleness - my finger is quite well, & I have not a scar about me, my face improves but not so fast. I think as when you were here it is so brown & smooth - but it feels so well that I almost fancy I am not ugly & I have already heard it whispered in the Room, that I have good features but no complexion - I drink the water regularly & often wash my face with the delicious water but I have only bathed twice.

The first time I bathed at night & thought myself rather the worse for it. Yesterday I bathed at ten in the forenoon & took some wine afterwards & a good walk & I am sure I am not worse to day, nor do I much think bathing is beneficial — my appetite is as good as when I was a ruddy growing school-girl at Leroc & I never slept better in my life — we have taken these apartments for 5 weeks more from to day so then we shall have been at Harrogate two months & after that I hope that your air or any air will do for me I must be content to be a curious sort of bonnette —

I like our quarters, but they have raised us to two pounds p. week — they have left the house we left the day we parted from you — to some foreigners — we often go up to High Harrogate — the company increases daily — but it is not nearly full yet. My dear Boy is I think going on very well & looks very healthy if the air is cool, but if it is warm he loses his color directly — but there cannot be much the matter with him as he eats & drinks well & works well & sleeps well — but I shall never feel confidence in my own opinion respecting a child's health again.

We are deep in De Vere now — our interest all alive — Pray my dear never say a word more respecting any kindnesses I have shown you unless you find me growing forgetful & ungrateful towards you & you take that method of reminding me of the ten — for benefits I have received ^{from} you & any estimable Brother to one tipse from me — I hope Miss Carr is well &c. we are now going for a walk & to put this in the Post — I am sorry I cannot make it worth the postage & I would have let you consider that no news is good news, only I feared a scolding may you and yours be protected by that.
